## A Nate from Our Pastor

Dear friends in Christ,
For Lutherans, the month of October is always a special time, because at the end of the month we celebrate the reformation of the church with what we call Reformation Sunday. Although many protestant denominations recognize the historical event that took place on October 31st as the beginning of the reformation, the day when Martin Luther posted his 95 Theses on the door of the church to confront the practices of the Roman Catholic Church, no one celebrates this day like Lutherans do. And my hope is that we will continue to celebrate this special event in history, because it reminds us of how important it is to continue to be a reformation church, and that we need to continue to be reforming what we are about and what our mission is. And it reminds us, that just as Luther did, we need to be reformed, by turning to, and returning to, scripture as our source of inspiration and guidance.

A speaker I heard recently spoke of how we learn to recognize the voices of people who are important in our lives. As children we immediately are drawn to the voices of our parents, and as other people grow in significance in our lives we recognize their voices with the same clarity as well. In a room full of various noises and many voices talking, we can pick out the voice of a friend we haven't seen in many years, as if it were the only voice in the room.

One of the reasons we study scripture is to help us recognize God's voice in our daily lives. As we spend time in our Bibles, reading, hearing, receiving the Word of God, we are better able to recognize and hear God's voice in the world around us. As we spend time in prayer and Bible study we encounter a living God, a God that is truly present everywhere. God can speak to us through people who love the Lord and through people who haven't practiced their faith in years. By taking time to pray and study the Word of God we can learn to recognize God's voice, and discern what is of God and what is not.

Martin Luther learned that some of what was being practiced in the church of his day was not God's voice and so he challenged it, and he challenged the notion that only the Pope or a priest could interpret scripture. He believed that all could and should read the Bible and so he translated the Bible into the language of the people. Luther also claimed that everyone is a priest, that we are a priesthood of believers, and that just like a priest, we all represent Jesus to everyone we meet. Christ is present everywhere, he is present within each one of us. He has claimed us in the waters of baptism and made us part of his priesthood, his chosen ones, and whether we like it or not, we all represent Jesus to everyone we meet. The question is, "How well do we represent Jesus to others?"

Luther had confidence that we can do this well. He said, "All Christians have the authority, the command, and the obligation to preach, to come before God to pray for one another, and to offer themselves as a sacrifice to God." As believers, Christ is with us, and we embody his presence to the world. So as we celebrate our Lutheran heritage this month, let's all accept our role as priests, delve into scripture so we might better recognize God's voice in the world, and share the love of Jesus with everyone we meet.

It's December 23, 1971, and heavy weather is forecast for Chicago. Russ
Hildebrandt, the associate pastor of a liberal suburban church, is on the brink of breaking free of a marriage he finds joyless - unless his wife, Marion, who has her own secret life, beats him to it. Their eldest child, Clem, is coming home from college on fire with moral absolutism, having taken an action that will shatter his father. Clem's sister, Becky, long the social queen of her high school class, has sharply veered into the counterculture, while their brilliant younger brother Perry, who's been selling drugs to seventh graders, has resolved to be a better person. Each of the Hildebrandts seeks a freedom that each of the others threatens to complicate.

Jonathan Franzen's novels are celebrated for their unforgettably vivid characters and for their keen-eyed take on contemporary America. Now, in Crossroads, Franzen ventures back into the past and explores the history of two generations. With characteristic humor and complexity, and with even greater warmth, he conjures a world that resonates powerfully with our own.

A tour de force of interwoven perspectives and sustained suspense, its action largely unfolding on a single winter day, Crossroads is the story of a Midwestern family at a pivotal moment of
moral crisis. Jonathan Franzen's gift for melding the small picture and the big picture has never been more dazzlingly evident.

SEPTEMBER 2023
Highlights

The monthly Church Council meeting was held on September 11th. Treasurer's report included monthly Benevolence offerings and other income of $\$ 23,592$. (YTD total is $\$ 266,433$ ). Operating expenses were $\$ 36,158$ (YTD total is $\$ 307,122$ ).

As of the end August, we have a negative operating budget deficit of $\$ 40,689$.
Pastor's report Pastor Tim reported that the building is alive with activity again. The Preschool is back in session and the Church's small groups are meeting again. We will be celebrating New Member Sunday on the 17 th . Christian Education is up and running again. We are always looking for more Sunday School teachers. Human Needs collected $\$ 475$ for the backpacks for Fill a Heart 4 Kids. The clothing drive for PADS will end on September 17th . Property had a productive workday on August 19th due to a good turnout of enthusiastic volunteers. Worship and Music met to plan out the fall season of hymns and special music. Long Range Planning will have their first meeting for the New Visioning. Old Business: The Gathering Area has received some of the new furniture. They hope to have the rest of the furniture soon. Talks are underway with LCNS on their upcoming lease. New Business: Jen Prosk, Wayne Giampietro and Jan Schwanke are the Nominating Committee for 2024. Council is looking into options for a new pictorial directory. Next council meeting is scheduled for October 9th, at 7:30 PM. All council meetings are open to Holy Spirit members. Minutes and reports of the council are kept in a public notebook in the narthex.

## What Belongs To God?

Traditionally the latter part of the Pentecost season has been a time of stewardship emphasis in our congregations. On any given Sunday in October or November you might hear a message on stewardship in your congregation. I remember vividly the feeling of panic that came upon me when I was a young and newly ordained pastor and needed to come up with a stewardship message for my congregation on "Stewardship Sunday." So when a lay member of the congregation volunteered to present a program on tithing I was elated and gladly accepted his offer. For his presentation he set up two tables in the front of the sanctuary. Then he began to demonstrate how we have been richly blessed by God and how little God requires of us in return. The presenter did this by taking 10 apples putting 9 of them on one table and one apple on the other. He did the same with 10 bananas and 10 oranges and 10 shirts, etc. Soon the table with the 9 items of each kind was stacked high with all kinds of blessings. And the table with one of each kind was dramatically less

abundant. His point was that tithing was a small thing to do in comparison to all that we have received. God gives us abundantly and expects so little of us, that we can surely give that little tithe. Then came the clincher when pointing to the abundant table of blessings, and said, "God has given us all this to do whatever we want, so at least we can give a tithe back to God."

Through the years I have come to understand how limited this concept of stewardship is. Sure, God does ask us to tithe. That is biblical. But the Bible doesn't stop with the tithe. Biblical stewardship has more to do with what we do with the $90 \%$ left after we tithe. These gifts are not just ours to do with as we please. All that God gives us is to be used according to God's will for us, our family, our community, our nation and all people. One of the Gospel stories we hear in congregations this time of year is the story of Jesus' encounter with the Pharisees. Trying to entrap him they asked, "Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, or not?" Jesus' answer was simple. He asked for a coin they used to pay the tax and then said, "Whose head and title is on this coin?" They answered, "The emperor's." Jesus said, "Give therefore to the emperor that things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's." And what belongs to God? Everything belongs to God. All things come from God and all things return to God. And all that we have been given is on loan to us from God and is to be used
according to God's will. To be a "steward" is to be in charge of someone else's property, which is to be used according to the owner's wishes. That's the biblical concept of stewardship.

Therefore stewardship includes all that we do and say. It includes all our resources and how we use them for the good of others. It includes all of our money and how we spend it. It includes how we respond to the needs of our neighbor and our world. It includes issues of justice and welfare for all God's people. The tithe is a biblical concept that is meant just to be a beginning point for our stewardship. And it is a good beginning point, but it is only a beginning point. I encourage you to look beyond the tithe as you consider the stewardship of the resources God has given you. We often pray:

Merciful Father, we offer with joy and thanksgiving what you have first given us ourselves, our time, and our possessions, signs of your gracious love. Receive them for the sake of him who offered himself for us, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
